NEWS FROM THE BRANCHES

KNOXVILLE—Five study groups are meeting monthly, while branch meetings are focusing on mission and are held every-other month.

- The October speaker is Amy Broyles, "Being a Woman on the County Commission."
- Plans for future programs include Foster Children Care Review Board, Being a Muslim Woman in Knoxville, and Suicide Prevention.
- Members have participated in voter registration.

MARYVILLE—There are five branch meetings and four leadership team meetings planned for2016-2017.

- Our first program entitled "Young Women and Leadership: Taking the World by Storm" featured two college women sharing their experiences, dreams, and appreciation to AAUW. One woman received the AAUW-TN NCCWSL scholarship and the other received the Agnes Thornton Bird Scholarship.
- Dr. Mark O'Gorman, Maryville College Political Science Professor, will be speaking "Why Gender Is Germane This October."
- The second "Expanding Your Horizons" STEM program for middle school girls will be held at Maryville, College.
- National Women History Month will be celebrated with a program similar to the past "Leading Ladies."
- Start Smart will continue one more year conducting wage negotiation skills workshops for college-age girls and men.
- Other activities include monthly book club, luncheons every other month, books sales, holiday cookie exchange, and Buffalo auction.

MURFREESBORO—Greetings from the 'Boro branch! To fulfill our mission of leveling the playing field for women and girls, we are staying focused on policy and education initiatives this election season.

- We have already exceeded our membership goal for the year with 6 new branch members!
- In partnership with the American

Democracy Project, branch members have registered nearly 175 voters on MTSU campus.

- In September, the branch hosted a panel entitled "What's at Stake for Women and Children in This Election," featuring AAUW-TN's own Public Policy Chair, Peggy Swann, as a panelist. The panel was videotaped by MTSU's College of Media and Entertainment and will be available on our branch website soon.
- In October, the branch for our second year staffed the Murfreesboro Half Marathon; we recruited over 50 volunteers from the branch and the community to help us raise operational funds.
- In November, we will hold an "Advocacy in Action" workshop as we gear up for the next legislative session.
- We will hold a Start Smart Workshop this November and are in discussions to bring the Work Smart Workshop to Murfreesboro soon.

OAK RIDGE--Oak Ridge AAUW had such a busy year last year that we have not planned any major events for 2016-17, but we do have a great lineup of programs.

- Program topics are Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services for School Children, Educational Goals for Women, Community Coalition against Human Trafficking, the Manhattan Project National Historic Park, and Biology in a Box.

With Love and Gratitude - A Letter of Appreciation to Members of AAUW - TN

Earlier this year, I was rewarded the amazing opportunity to attend the 2016 National Conference for College Women Student Leaders, and it was nothing short of a phenomenal experience. I owe this opportunity to the wonderful members of the AAUW TN Organization. To these members, thank you for believing in me and for giving me this experience.

The conference opened my eyes to many pressing issues young collegiate women face: stress management, gender bias, campus sexual assault, intersectionality, and so much more. Our first exercise at the conference

was about expressing our opinions and beliefs. This was a moving experience for me, especially when the presenter asked, "Do you think you have become less confident since being in college?"



Although I consider myself a strong leader on my campus, I had recently become discouraged in my beliefs. I got the opportunity to stand in front of the conference and explain why I had recently becomes less confident. I explained that in Tennessee we are predominantly conservative and that most of my peers do not believe women should excel in the workplace and that the pay gap exists. Back home when I stood up for my beliefs, I found peers talking over me or superiors down at me. *However, NCCWSL quickly changed my* discouragement. Through NCCWSL, I learned that my voice deserves to be heard and not to back down when things get tough.

All of my experiences at NCCWSL were life changing. I got the opportunity to lobby on Capitol Hill alongside AAUW. I heard powerful women who have exceled in the workforce talk about their experiences. I went to workshops that taught me important

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IMPACTING THE STATE: AAUW-TN Public Policy

For the third year, national AAUW has awarded Tennessee an IMPACT Grant. Our public policy approach in 2016-2107 is to continue momentum for equal pay by building on the cumulative success of AAUW-TN. We have been extremely busy this fall. So far we have

Sponsored Voter Registration Drives. Across the state, AAUW has been registering voters.

- AAUW-Memphis registered 94 students at Southwest Tennessee Community College-Union Campus.
- AAUW-Maryville registered voters at the Vienna Coffee House in Maryville (September 21) and at Pellissippi State Community College, Blount County Campus (September 28).
- AAUW-Murfreesboro and the American Democracy Project registered 175 voters at Middle Tennessee State University on August 22 and on October 3.
- AAUW-Tennessee co-sponsored a GOTV Breakfast with the Women's Political Collaborative of Tennessee in Nashville on October 22.

Held Training on the Pay Gap—AAUW-TN President Samantha Cantrell facilitated "Growing Our Economy, Growing Our Families: Equal Pay" to educate invited candidates and state legislators about the gender pay gap (downtown Nashville Public Library, October 10). Dr. Cantrell noted that on average women in Tennessee are paid just 81 percent of what men are paid, although women are now contributors and/ or providers in a majority of Tennessee households. Should the gap be closed in Tennessee, an additional \$8.78 billion would be pumped into our state economy. Candidates were asked how they might respond when voters ask: How could you address the pay gap between men and women? How would you address the pay gap for female minorities and mothers?

Published a Tennessee Voters' Issues Guide,

2016-2017—"Closing the Gaps in Tennessee: The Pay Gap & The Insurance Gap" serves as a resource for Tennessee Voters, 2016 Election and 2017 Legislative Session. Each section consists of an overview of the gap, what key phrases to listen for in public and private discussions, and what questions should be asked of candidates and elected officials. By speaking out on these issues, we can help to shape the conversation both now, during the election, and later, once the newly seated state legislature convenes in 2017.

Created "Take the Pledge#ClosetheGap"— Take the Pledge is a social media roll out campaign that asks candidates, voters, elected officials, and organizations to sign an online petition to close the pay gap.
