A Letter from Our President...

Dear AAUW Friends.

Each day, I am reminded of how relevant our work is to discussions right here in Tennessee in the run-up to Election Day. This year, while I serve as state president, I will also fulfill my last year as branch president of AAUW Murfreesboro. The work that I have led in the Murfreesboro branch provides a timely example of how AAUW, whether at the state level or locally, can evolve with the times and handily meet the challenges of the 21st century. At 105, the Murfreesboro branch is young enough to embrace the next generation with open arms.

In the course of five years, Murfreesboro has become a place where influential women and men – no matter their background – can come together to capture the hearts and minds of the public at large and ultimately those of elected officials.

PRESIDENT'S LETTER continued

Through innovative new programs and the creation of <u>the charitable arm</u> for the branch, we have been able to make good on a number of objectives that AAUW of Tennessee prioritizes: i) We have new leadership roles to engage a bigger pipeline of talented women; ii) Our branch is now one of the most diverse in terms of race and age, (though we have more work to do); iii) For every one member, we can turnout two other individuals in the community to our events; iv) We also created a shared table in Rutherford County of organizations serving women and girls, called <u>Advance Rutherford</u>, to amplify our priorities.

I can see the opportunities for AAUW of Tennessee through Murfreesboro's experience with tremendous change and growth. At the AAUW-TN Leadership Summit this past June, I established that my administration will focus on the following three priorities:

- **Transparency**: Digitize and centralize financial and administrative records and reports
- **Impact**: Tie state activities to results that are measured in terms of members, friends, anecdotes and new revenue
- **Revenue Generation:** Determine what works to establish new annualized revenue

I have spent my first months in office working with an ad hoc finance committee to review our books and find opportunities for moving the state to sound financial footing. Over the next few months, you will be able to contribute to the state through two opportunities. The Birthday Circle collects donations in the amount of the state's age (92 this year) or your age on your birthday. High Five for the state aims to raise \$5 per member by Equal Pay Day (April 2, 2019). Donations may be made directly by members or by branches on behalf of their members.

These new funds will increase revenue by over 50%, eliminate our reliance on reserve funds and directly support two coveted programs that the state offers at the \$1000 level each: scholarships to attend the NCCWSL conference in June in DC, and the public policy program, which coordinates our presence on the Women's Day on the Hill.

The state has implemented a membership challenge, which has been accepted by seven of the nine branches in the state. Each branch has agreed to aim to retain 90% of its membership and increase membership by 10% (5% by a younger set of women and 5% by women of color).

Finally, I am excited to announce that this year's public policy program will engage members to work with their mayors and city councils to enact salary history bans and to work on equal pay legislation at the state legislature.

Still unsure of the role of AAUW-TN? Here's a good purpose statement for our work together: AAUW-TN amplifies the impact of local branches in and across the state through coordination and organizational support. This year we are focused on our ongoing strategic goal: To operate as a financially solvent, growing, and influential organization that works to improve the climate for women and girls in Tennessee.

The ability to shape the public debate is as large as one's imagination. Join me this year as we work together to meet our challenges by recruiting new members, engaging our friends and shaping the public debate.
